# Torrey Pines Gulls Slope Combat Fiesta 2024



### What/When:

A fun day of slope soaring at Poway Slope on Saturday October 5, 1pm-4pm including foamy combat. If you have other slope aircraft suitable for Poway, those are welcomed too, but the focus of the afternoon will be on combat. Please use the signup link below if you are interested in attending as attendance is limited and first come first served.

### Where:

From I-15, exit Poway Road going east. After crossing the intersection of Springhurst Drive, be in the right lane and look for a right turn on Cobblestone Creek Road, a private road maintained by those living in the direct community. Please drive slowly (<10mph) on Cobblestone Creek Road, smile and wave, be courteous, pull to the side if there is oncoming traffic. Continue following Cobblestone Creek Road slowly and wherever there is a choice, always choose to turn uphill. Tom Farley's home address is 12601 Cobblestone Creek Road (however some map apps will not get you to the house, so follow the red path below).



When you arrive to the top, please pull into one of the designated parking areas. There should be parking for 15-20 cars and we may need to park one behind the other to get them all to fit, but they will fit. Please leave your key in the car with the car unlocked in case parking attendant Tom Farley needs to move your car to fit more cars into the area. The Farleys will be serving a light lunch at noon for those who wish to participate and will have appetizers and drinks available all afternoon. **How:** If the winds are forecast to be out of the west, we'll fly combat all afternoon. If the winds are forecast to be fickle, bring a Radian anyway and we'll have fun (but no combat with Radians). The event is designed to be for TPG members and their invited guests only. We are looking for a maximum of 20 on this first combat mission and then will grow from there on future missions. Future missions are predicated on not bothering the neighbors while on Cobblestone Creek Road on the drive in and out of the facility so please be courteous.

Tom will have a golf cart available at the house for those who would benefit from transport from the house up to the flying site. Others can make the short walk along the same dirt path.

Expect to fly 48" flying wings made of EPP or white foam, expect to have a lot of fun and "interesting" flying, and be careful of cactus and snakes when retrieving aircraft.

# Torrey Pines Gulls Slope Combat Fiesta 2024 (continued)



### Basic Rules:

- You score a kill when, after you impact another glider, and
  - o the other glider is on the ground (or in the cactus), and
  - o you complete a loop or a roll
- Walking down the hill to get your downed plane is "the walk of shame". You can earn back some respect if you walk through cactus ©
- If someone on the hill says "I am not a target", you must avoid hitting their lovely, crunchy, aircraft"
- Advice:
  - Bring water and sunscreen and a hat
  - o Bring strapping tape (field repairs will be required) 🕲
  - Be prepared for your cheeks to hurt from grinning...yes...those cheeks!
  - o If anyone needs help building, setting up, or whatever, just ask in the #Slope Soaring channel on the TPG Discord server.

# September DLG – Poway Invitational Report – Justin Tolman, CD

The Fourth Annual Poway Invitational took place on Saturday, September 21st, 2024. Eighteen pilots, including four contesting with electric-powered aircraft, convened at the Poway Flight Facility. The dry and dusty conditions were a stark contrast to the lush greenery that usually adorns the area during the spring International. The 8:15am pilot's meeting kicked off the day under clear skies. It was cool early but that wouldn't last long.

Despite the early start to the long day, the air was active and there was lift to be found early in Round 1 (Task K, Big Ladder). In Group A, Cory Shantz started the day strong, dropping just 10 seconds across his 5 flights to take the K. In Group B, Gary Fogel raised the bar and dropped only 8 seconds to take the K. By the time Group C took the field, conditions were quickly becoming more active and challenging. Ed LaCroix took the K in the group, dropping 27 seconds. The strong showing from these three pilots right off the bat in Round 1 set the tone for the entire prelims.

The daunting Task G (Best Flight) greeted pilots in Round 2. But the air was active and the top pilots took advantage of the conditions. In Group A, Shantz and Fogel both flew a maximum 9:59 to share the K. In Group B, our youngest competitor, Will Lalla, put in a fantastic 9:59 to take the K over Charles Martin (who missed sharing the K by a mere half second). In Group C, 6 pilots flew for over 5-minutes but LaCroix was the only pilot who was able to fly the entire working time to earn the K.

By Round 3 (Task J, Last 3), the air was heating up and so was the competition. With one minute of spare working time, this task often sees multiple pilots sharing the K. In Group A, Shantz and electric pilot Arthur Markiewicz did just that, maximizing all 3 of their flights. In Group B, Fogel was the lone pilot nabbing all 3, 3-minute flights. Three pilots in Group C got the job done to share the K: LaCroix, John McNeil and Lalla.

Swift decision making and efficient quick turns would reward pilots in Round 4 (Task H, 1,2,3,4). In Group A, Shantz would drop only 9 seconds to take the K over Mike Smith. In Group B, Milan Bregman put in a stellar four flights and would drop only 8 seconds to take the K over Justin Tolman. In Group C, Fogel dropped just 9 seconds to take the K over Markiewicz.

Many pilots capitalized on the lifty afternoon air of Round 5 (Task A, Last Flight - 5:00 max). In Group A, Fogel, Scott Mccurdy and Mike Swanson put in great flights to maximize their times and share the K. In Group B, Shantz was again all alone at the top after a remarkable flight. Cory was deep down wind to the east, below tree height, only to take advantage of a booming thermal that saved his contest (as that thermal was the only way his one plane was coming back). In Group C, all six pilots shared the K after full 5-minute flights (Bregman, Smith, Lalla, Chuck Norris, Martin & McNeil).

An hour-long break allowed pilots to grab a bite to eat at Rubio's or rest and relax.

# September DLG – Poway Invitational Report (continued)

After lunch, breezy but very lifty conditions prevailed for Round 6 (Task C, AULD). In Group A, working the west end of the field mostly by himself, Tom Farley had the best 3 flights to take the K over Tolman. In Group B, Fogel and Smith found lift in all 3 of their flights to max their times and share the K. In Group C, it was Shatz who was perfect in all 3 of his flights to earn the K.

The late afternoon air of round 7 was a perfect time for Poker. In Poker, each pilot has up to 3 self-nominated declarations to accumulate 9:59 of flight time. In Group A, Shantz went "all in" and his single flight was successful in taking the K over Tolman's 3-flight 8:29. In Group B, carnage ensued. Swanson's two-flight 4:30 snagged the K by just one second over Norris' 3-flight 4:29. LaCroix and Lalla both suffered landouts. In Group C, Fogel took a conservative 3-flight approach to the challenging conditions to rack up 7:29 and take the K.

Big, cyclical lift had moved in by Round 8 (Task B, Last 2). You either found a big ride or came right back. In Group A, Markiewicz's two flights accumulated 4:16 but that was enough to earn him the K over Farley. In Group B, Smith, LaCroix, Fogel and Tolman got their first 4-minute flight. All 4 subsequently got hammered on their second launch. While Tolman landed out, Smith's second flight of 1:44 edged out the rest of the group to take the K.

# September DLG – Poway Invitational Report (continued)

Heading into the flyoffs, Shantz and Fogel were tied with perfect scores after the drop. LaCroix, Smith, Bregman, Tolman and Markiewicz rounded out the 7 pilot flyoff field.

Round 9 (Task I, 3 Longest) kicked off the flyoffs around 4pm. Shantz put in 3 excellent flights, dropping just 10 seconds, to take the K over Fogel.

Huge Ladder in Round 10 required perfect execution in challenging conditions. Fogel bested the group with just a 2-minute flight on the group's first launch. Fogel and Markiewicz would both maximize their 2nd launch and get all 5-minutes. Huge lift cycled through for the group's final, 7-minute, attempt and 6 out of the 7 got all, or nearly all, of their 7-minute flight. After 3 launches, Fogel took the K by 16 seconds over Markiewicz and put some distance between himself and his closest competitors.

Two more launches in Round 11 (Task D, 2x5) would decide it. Smith put in two stellar flights, dropping just 3 seconds to take the K but Fogel wasn't far behind, dropping just 7 seconds.

At the end of the day, it was Gary Fogel who carried preliminary round consistency through the flyoffs to take the win. Mike Smith was second and Cory Shantz was third. Arthur Markiewicz was our top motorized pilot who finished 7th overall.

# September Team DLG Contest Report – John McNeil, CD

We held the second-ever Team DLG contest on the Sunday after the Poway Invitational. We were fortunate to be joined by some out-of-town guests, giving us three teams of four pilots. This was ideal, as it allowed us to fly eight rounds with a single heat and be finished by noon. We all got to fly a bunch, with 9 planes more or less continually working lift all over the Poway sky.

### The results were:

- 1. Team "FRROR 404: Lift Not Found"
- 2. Team "Resident Aliens"
- 3. Team "Gopher Barbers"

### **Team Gopher Barbers recap** By John McNeil

This iteration of the Gopher Barbers was composed of Don Lochhead, Will Lalla, Scott McCurdy, and John McNeil. We synched as a team pretty quickly and went about the business of finding and staying in lift. The first 2 rounds, which were best 3 3's, then last 2 3's, are not turn-around tasks. Thus, "all" we had to do was churn out 3-minute flights. Of course, the lift was moving around, so we couldn't just return to the same thermal. formation to cover as much sky as possible. All-in-all, we were off to a good start. Round three was 1, 2, 3, and 4 minutes in any order. Of course, we did not fly the target times in the ideal order. Nonetheless, we got our four minutes in style, with all of us specking out.

By around 10:30, the thermals started drifting Eastward at a good pace. This proved difficult for us as a team in rounds 4 and 5. Round 6 was 9:59 with unlimited throws. We hooked a ride with our first throw and flew 5:33. The other teams had to re-light into the thermal we found for them, but they had the last laugh as we were unable to follow it downwind for the full window. By round 7, we pulled ourselves together and made two of the three 3-minute targets in all-up, last-down. What felt really good was flying 8 minutes as a team in round 8!

On landing we called end of window, and the last of us to launch would result in a 6-minute flight. We set out for the lift but Ed and Charles were not finding it and were slowly sinking out. Also not finding the target lift, Cory used his launch height to play a hunch, found lift 180 degrees away, and JT told Ed and Charles where to go. But their sink appeared to be dooming them. As they both floated back north, towards the south edge, midpoint of the field, they bumped and turned- with Charles being the lower of the two (20' off the deck?). With JT urging them on, they BOTH made the low save as they drifted down the field to the north and east and got out.

Given that none of us had flown in the previous team event (unlike the other two teams) we felt we executed our strategies well and all of us Resident Aliens are looking forward to the next Team DLG contest. We are ready to go another round with the Error 404 and Gopher Barber teams. As for Error 404's victory? It was such Bullsh\*t! ③

Arthur and Cliff both flew motorized DLGs while Chuck and Gary, well, "chucked."

Prior to the contest, the lift was very buoyant under a low and thick marine layer that covered the tops of the local hills. Similar conditions remained as the contest started. Given that knowledge and our assignment to the west end of the field, we decided as a team to all fly towards the SW quadrant but on slightly different headings. Gary served as the coxswain and Arthur hooked up quickly, and from there, round 1 was pretty easy as the air was generally lifty, and all 9 DLGs were in the same crowded airspace indicating lift. We got the first 3:00, had some difficulty acquiring again (and a minor incident described below) and settled for a 1:47 and then acquired again and got another 3:00 all on the creekside to take the K.

This was Arthur's first task in team DLG. Pretty sure he didn't know what to expect going in, but Arthur is a quick learner and super pilot. During the second flight, and in the middle of the large gaggle of 9 planes, Arthur had a midair with another pilot. It wasn't a severe midair by the looks of it but in the spirit of team competition, Arthur immediately stated "wow I really nailed that guy!" to which fellow team member Chuck said "hey wait! That was me!!!" We proceeded to all bust out laughing which probably caused other teams to wonder what the heck was going on with us. But the incident kept us loose and there was fortunately no serious damage to either plane. We checked both prior to relaunching for that last 3:00 which caused a bit of lost time.


For round 2 Chuck served as the coxswain. He deserved a break after round 1. The task of last two flights 3 min max was again not all that challenging, as the air was lifting everywhere to the creekside. We repeated our process of agreeing on a general direction before launch, fanning out, quickly identifying the best lift in our sector and then merging to secure it. We tied the Resident Aliens for the K.

For round 3 it was Arthur's turn as coxswain. Very quickly he became "Sergeant at Arms" Markiewicz. The task was a 1,2,3,4 and we really felt balanced as Arthur got the hang of telling us to help whoever was the lowest pilot etc. We managed to get the 3 and then 4 and then the 2, but given the discussions on the ground between flights and not all landing at the same time, we dropped a bit over a minute. We were subjected to more deserved barking by our new favorite Sergeant task master. But we were still laughing, having fun, and learning as we went. Very loose. Making it up as we went but with a general plan before each round.

Round 4 was a bit more of a challenge. I believe it was in this round that John as CD had kindly rotated the teams and somehow, we were now at the east end of the field rather than the west end. The timing could not have been more perfect! Cliff, our coxswain directed us along the tree line and we got the first of two 4 min flights. We relaunched into the same thermal. We took the K but in all honesty that one was more about the fortune of field position. Thanks to John for arranging a thermal next to our launch area. We gladly took the K.

Round 5 was a best flight 9:59 max. This one was a challenge. We rotated coxswains again back to Gary. Error 404 launched to the NE and eventually hooked up, joined not long after by Resident Aliens in the thermal. By now, the thermals were going strong with blue skies. And fortunately, at altitude the thermals were wide enough so as to allow for blue sky between DLGs without too much issue. We were very pleased with an 8:16.4 out of the 9:59 and really everyone flew super, especially Cliff who was high man on the stack for quite a while at the limit of vision. But he hung in there! Go team go!

Round 6 – Poker is hard enough without a team thing but this one really required some strategy. We went in thinking 2 min was a good call. We sandbagged just a bit to see where others would go. They launched mainly to the west and to the NW tree line and indicated nothing, so we opted to go NE again. We got the 2 min call, but barely. However, on the way home we had a good indication of another thermal to the east; so we called 2 again and went back and Arthur found it and we hooked up again. We discussed the need to go for it and scouted on the return in different directions. I can't remember who had the read but we called end of window and relaunched, found it and it ended up being a boomer again. 8:27 total for the K. Chuck did a super job of keeping us all aligned on that crazy round.

Round 7 – With Arthur back in charge, we went for all up last downs. This round ended up being difficult for us. Apparently, we excelled at the downs. We were now positioned in the mid field area by CD order to rotate. We managed a 2:25 on the first flight (first to land) and didn't feel good about it. The next was much easier but everyone got the 3. On the last flight we managed to eke out a 1:04.9 but didn't realize until later that Gopher Barbers had done just slightly better at 1:15.0. In the end, the Barbers took that one with the K. Good work Barbers, nice close shave.

Round 8 – with Cliff as coxswain we huddled for the last flight round of the contest. We felt the need to go for it from the start as it was best flight and we had unlimited launches so why not go. We launched on time, but somehow 0.5 seconds behind the Resident Aliens. Those Aliens must have some quick trigger fingers. Not sure where the Barbers went initially but by the end, all 12 planes were to the east of the field, enjoying what had to be some of the best lift of the day with pilots having a good time and trying to avoid each other in a massive thermal. If it were this easy throughout the day we wouldn't have had a contest. Argh, missed the K by that 0.5s but hey; we were pleased with the 9:58.5 to end the contest.

All in all, we had a super time and really enjoyed the format. Arthur is now "sold" and eagerly awaiting his next opportunity to bark orders at teammates. ERROR 404 for the win! "To err is human, to win at team DLG divine"

The format is team-only; there are no individual scores. Each team requires four pilots. You have plenty of time, so start getting your teams together – and start practicing!

### Team DLG format:

- Teams consist of exactly four pilots.
- In each heat, three of the pilots fly while one pilot times and provides team direction.
- Each round, the timer is rotated. After four rounds, all team members will have timed once.
- Contest rounds follow F3K formats except:
  - Flight timing
    - Flight time starts when the last of three pilots releases the model.
    - Flight time ends when the first of three pilots time would end.
    - If any pilot lands out of bounds, then the flight scores zero.
    - (In other words, all three pilots fly each flight together for a single flight time)
  - o For Poker:
    - The timing team member makes the time nomination.
    - All three pilots must make the nominated time (see flight timing above).
    - Timer can force the whole team to re-flight to maximize the score

## 2024 TPG Tow Hook Series - F3L/F3RES/TD/1.5m

### Who

AMA pilots who are interested in flying with friends, improving their thermal flying skills, and competing for fun.

### Why

The goals of this program are:

- Provide a fun, relaxed monthly contest where low-cost aircraft can be competitive
- Various classes encourage greater participation
- Overcome the current field limitations for F3L of 12 pilots max, at Encinitas and 8 at Poway
- Maintain a home for AMA TD competition
- Develop a competitive thermal format for sailplanes under 250g

### What

### Format:

This format is similar to the successful BARCS FxRES format with modifications to suit our TPG community and fields.

This is a simple format with a 4-hour window, where competitors will fly a number of flights in the window to be determined by the CD based on that day's registration (see the classes section for maximum flight times). There is a landing bonus using F3L landing tapes for all classes. Launches made after the open window will receive zero landing points if within 30 seconds. All launches must occur during the open window. After the 4-hour open flying window, the CD shall tally the scores and may choose to have fly-off rounds. Points in fly-off will be added to points from open flying.

### Launches:

Pilots launching RES from bungees are allowed to re-fly if they have a pop-off up to two times in the open window. Winch launch (TD) pilots may have one re-fly if they pop-off.

### Landings:

Landings count if there are no shed parts. Upside-down is ok. Landings where the nose is buried and the tail is in the air are also given a zero score.

# 2024 TPG Tow Hook Series - F3L/F3RES/TD/1.5m (continued)

### **Aircraft Classes**

Pilots may fly in any one or two of the three classes below. We will fly up to 3 classes depending on attendance:

- 1.5m RES bungee launch. Max flying weight is 250g. Construction materials and techniques must follow F3L rules.
   Maximum flight time is 5 minutes.
- 2m RES bungee launch. Construction materials and techniques must follow F3L rules Maximum flight time is 6 minutes.
- AMA thermal duration open class. Winch launch. Skegs are allowed Maximum flight time is 10 minutes.

### **Equipment**

At least three landing tapes will be provided, marked for F3L. AMA TD will use the same landing bonus formula as the other classes.

F3L compliant bungees will be provided by the club and set up at the CD's direction. At the CDs discretion, all bungees may be shortened from F3L standard to accommodate field conditions.

### Winches:

A single winch will be provided by the club when at least 2 pilots register at least one week in advance. The winch shall be set up in parallel with, and at the same length as the stretched bungees. The winch will not have a retriever. The winch shall be run until the chute is at the turn-around after every launch.

### When

Refer to posted schedules on RCGroups and the Torrey Pines Gulls website.

#### Where

TPG Encinitas Flight Center, except within 5 days following rain, when the contest will relocate to the Poway Flight Center.

#### How

John McNeil, in the role of TPG Thermal coordinator, will recruit a CD for each contest. This format does not require the sound system or timing board, but does require bungees and sometimes a winch.

## F5J Fun Fly and Contest/Clinic Series

TPG will continue our F5J style foamy fun fly contests (and clinic) in 2024 at our Poway field. This is truly a fun-fly and a great way to get into F5J style flying. Any foamy or stick-built plane up to 2m (or so) is welcome. Night Radians are very popular but we also see Yellow Jackets (stick-built) and a variety of other vintage foamy and balsa stick-built aircraft.

We fly 7-minute windows with standard F5J landing tapes. If you are just getting started and do not have an Altis yet, no problem. Your timer will give you the 30 second call to cut your motor and the CD will announce a default launch height to be used for scoring purposes.

We typically pause mid-contest for a quick clinic. Subjects generally focus on F5J topics of interest to pilots getting into the format. The events are free but we still ask all pilots to sign up on F3X Vault so we know how many to expect and can run the matrix ahead of time.

For 2024 we have one more event scheduled:

October 26

# What is LSF? – Gary Fogel

The League of Silent Flight (LSF) <a href="https://www.silentflight.org/">https://www.silentflight.org/</a> is the special interest group (SIG) representing RC soaring to the Academy of Model Aeronautics. LSF has its own lengthy and important history, having first been conceived of in Northern California over 50 years ago, and helps arrange the annual RC soaring Nationals at Muncie, Indiana each summer. In addition to this, LSF has two types of Soaring Accomplishment Programs (SAPs) that encourage personal skill development in the sport and are fun! There is an SAP that is strictly for RC soaring (the oldest and original SAP) and with the advent of electric launch methods, an eSAP was added more recently that duplicates the original SAP but with the use of electric motors for launch.

Each SAP consists of a series of five levels of achievement with increasing difficulty (Figure 1). The levels involve slope and thermal soaring, spot landings, crosscountry flights and participation at contests. A pilot needs to achieve Level I before proceeding to Level II and so forth all the way up through Level V.

## What is LSF? - (continued)



Similarly, pilots who regularly hone their skills at contests generally improve in overall performance and over time, seek increasingly different and difficult tasks. By the time a pilot achieves Level IV, the Level V tasks can feel daunting. A 2-hour thermal duration flight. An 8-hour slope duration flight (some refer to this as the "bladder test"). A goal and return cross-country flight of 6.2 miles out and 6.2 miles back. Its longer than it seems. And Level V requires 3 contest wins at large contests over 20 participants. These days it can be hard to find contests of this size, and the requirement to win them really means the pilot has to be on the top of their game. It can take years or decades for a pilot to complete Level V. Some pilots never do complete Level V; in fact, only 138 people in the history of the program have done so.

So how do you get started? It's **EASY**. Firstly, go to: <a href="https://www.silentflight.org/index.php/lsf-program/lsf-tasks">https://www.silentflight.org/index.php/lsf-program/lsf-tasks</a> and print out a copy of the voucher form. Choose the path you wish (SAP and/or eSAP)

Bring the appropriate voucher with you to any of our many TPG events in 2024 and participate! If, for instance, you are flying in an F5J contest, each landing can be considered as a spot landing for the Level I and II requirements. Even the contest flights can have sufficient time to satisfy Level I requirements. Whenever you do make an achievement, have the contest director or your timer sign your form as a witness. We have Torrey Pines Gliderport (and other slopes) at our disposal – easy to get a 15 min slope flight with your buddies.

Once you've completed all of the Level I tasks, submit the completed voucher to LSF Secretary Walter "Wally" Adazczik at <a href="Isf secretary@silentflight.org">Isf secretary@silentflight.org</a> as a pdf scan or photo that clearly shows the witness signatures. Wally will then review your voucher and email you your acceptance or rejection of the voucher submission. If for some reason your voucher is rejected, you will have to adjudicate rejections with Wally.

A question then – who in the TPG has what LSF levels in SAP and eSAP? Well, we collect that information as a part of membership renewal. The Table on the following page provides the current LSF Levels for those who indicated so on their membership forms. This can (and should!) of course change over time.

Note that we have many members who are SAP Level I and 3 members who are eSAP Level 1. It doesn't take much for them to get to Level II. At the other end of the spectrum, we have 8 members who are Level IV. It's going to take some teamwork to get them to Level V. In between we have lots of pilots who can benefit by flying in our contests or getting out for some slope duration at Torrey, etc. If you aren't on the list and have achieved an LSF level, please let me know.

## What is LSF? - (continued)



How many Level increases can TPG members achieve in 2024 for either SAP or eSAP? Feel free to reach out to me or others on this list and they will be pleased to help recommend some strategies or serve as a witness if they can, for your achievements. On June 8, we're planning an LSF day at Poway and Torrey to help get people signed off. We might throw in some additional LSF days if there is interest.

Use our many contests and fun flys as a way to help advance in these programs. Just be sure to bring your vouchers and if necessary, arrange in advance for the proper number and type of witnesses so they can sign your form afterwards.

So, verify that the club has your correct email, make sure you receive an invitation to join Google Groups and sign up!



To get started, click on the link or web page below to get to the TPG Club forum. You can also get there from the Clubs link at the lower right of the RCGroups home page and scroll down to Torrey Pines Gulls.



If you haven't yet joined RCGroups, click on the <u>Sign Up</u> link at the upper right and follow the instructions.

Once you've navigated to the Torrey Pines Gulls Forum, you can subscribe to the Forum or to any of the individual threads within the Forum.


Unlike the old Yahoo Forum, RCGroups allows you to post photos and videos. By subscribing, you can keep up with the latest events, club activities and member postings.


