
So come join our 2025 virtual meetings, hang in there through the presentation, get that winning raffle ticket and see what you might win next December!

TPG at the 2024 MCAS Miramar Air Show – Gary Fogel

In the mid-1980s, during the height of "Top Gun" and everything that went with it, the Torrey Pines Gulls used to have a display at the airshow running for all three days with members manning the booth with lots of good outreach to the public. In 1985 and 1986 we even had permission to provide a demonstration of RC soaring from the runway just as the gates opened and prior to the manned flights. There weren't a lot of spectators at the time, but nonetheless it was fun to launch and land from the runway. I had a few nice flights with a ¼ scale Schweizer TG-3 on the winch but it was too early in the morning for any thermals. Unfortunately, over time the RC events were no longer included in the airshow and TPG decided that the effort to run a booth was not worth the investment of time and energy.

Fast-forward to 2024 when the San Diego Section of the American Institute for Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA-SD) is asked to be a part of a new Innovation and Tech Expo associated with the MCAS Miramar Air Show. This expo was intended to have STEM-related displays mainly for K-12 students but really the public of all ages, to encourage their interest in robotics, drones, batteries, computing, etc. AIAA-SD agreed to sponsor a booth, and in turn asked to see if there were any other non-profit organizations interested in assisting with their space helping to support their non-profit as well as AIAA-SD. Given I'm a member of both AIAA and TPG, and given the expo was going to be in the same hangar as where TPG used to display models in the 1980s, it was hard for me to say no.



Thus, on the Sunday morning of the airshow I found myself chatting between 9am and 1pm with about 200 people, having them handle a Zagi THL or a 2m Yellow Jacket and discussing launch and control methods. Unfortunately, base rules preclude the use of transmitters during the airshow, so it was impossible to have kids actively control transmitters. However, I pulled together a set of 50-60 images of different types of RC soaring and displayed these on a TV screen at the booth along with the TPG logo and QR code taking them directly to the club website. (Thanks, Dale, for the QR code!) These images and access to the website helped a lot. I also printed up about 120 trifold flyers for people to take with them for more info. Cliff Hunter provided a poster board of TPG photos that was used previously for outreach – this worked great and added to the display. (Thanks Cliff!)


While there are logistical challenges to all of this it was great fun and there was lots of interest. Adults were interested in knowing where we fly, how its possible to keep a plane aloft without a motor, etc. One modeler from Belgium stopped by and despite barely speaking English, was very excited to see RC models! He immediately went for his cell phone and showed me some beautiful pictures of his old-timer RC aircraft that he flies in Belgium as a member of the Society of Antique Modelers. One person who stopped by was a prior member of the Gulls in the 1970s, was thinking of aetting back into it, and was happy to see that we still existed. Two of my former students from SDSU showed up and we enjoyed chatting about their current directions in aerospace. And we enjoyed a solid uptick in website traffic associated with airshow.

All in all, a fun morning representing the Gulls. It was a bit of a challenge at times to chat with anyone over the roar of an F-35 demonstration, and a bit of a challenge to keep kids engaged before their parents pull them off to the next exhibit booth. But for not having had a presence at the airshow in decades, I think this was a good first step. Thanks to the AIAA-SD for providing the opportunity and its something for the 2025 TPG executive committee to decide if it's worth pursuing this again next year. We would definitely benefit from a larger team of volunteers if we do. Thanks again to Nick and AIAA-SD for this opportunity in 2024!

On October 5, 2024, a group of roughly 15 TPG members made their way to the top of the Poway Slope for a combat session. The last combat session at this location was held prior to the pandemic - it was well past time to have another. Fortunately for us, our very own TPG member Tom Farley and his wife Debbie own a home at the top of the slope. They were exceptionally generous in inviting TPG members to park on their property and walk from there to the flying site. Together with Debbie's sister Peggy, they even prepared lunch for those who RSVPed in time! Thank you, Tom and Debbie for your hospitality!

The winds were really quite nice for a first-time event like this, not too light and not too strong. Just enough to have some fun close quarters combat. The lift did cycle throughout the day and there were times when everyone had plenty of lift and energy and times when everyone was scratching just to stay airborne.

We held a short pilot's meeting just to review the plan for the day – one all afternoon round of combat with total scores at the end. Pilots who downed a plane had to show a roll or loop to get the "kill." People were welcomed to fly Ahis, Radians or whatever they wanted – however they just needed to declare they were not a target and stay high and away from the ruckus. We did a little bit of test flying near Tom's house and then made our way out to the top of the hill. Tom was kind to transport Dale Gottdank to the top of the hill with a golf cart. It had been more than 5 years since Dale flew due to medical issues and Dale was very pleased to be able to make it and fly with everyone. Gary Fogel programmed these to two Spektrum transmitters that Arthur also donated and both aircraft were flown at the slope by Justin Tolman and Scott McCurdy. This was Justin's first time flying an RC flying wing and he did great! I believe it was the first time either member had been involved with combat. Thank you, Arthur for making these planes available for newcomers! We hope to fly with you next time.

TPG Student Mentor Day at Torrey – Gary Fogel

On October 19, 2024 we repeated last year's successful student-mentor day at Torrey with ~25 students from AIAA-UCSD led by their group representative Jorge Vergara. Also in attendance were Nick Candrella, Chair of the AIAA-San Diego Chapter as well as Noah Rubin, a professor of electrical engineering at UCSD. These individuals were led by five TPG mentors Ian Cummings, Chuck Norris, John McNeil, Marty Zimmerman, and Gary Fogel to a fun day of instructional flights at Torrey. Bob Hirsch also attended as photographer and assisted another TPG guest not hailing from UCSD with mentoring. Craig Hanson also attended and was one of the first off the cliff with his Windfree to "test the waters" and show there was sufficient lift for soaring.

The weather cooperated in that it was a beautiful southern California dav. However, that sunshine didn't come with a lot of wind. The forecast was for 8kts out of the west but I'd say at best that was more like 6kts. One paraglider scratched on the edge just for a bit before giving up. RC training relegated only to very light floaters at altitudes below "three mistakes high" (not ideal) but without any PG traffic (ideal).

Gary led things off just after 1pm with a review of the history of the gliderport and its four forms of flight, including a safety briefing for window rules. The group walked to the top of the LZ and reviewed landing areas and also manned sailplane operation layout. After the briefing, students divided among mentors and received further instruction on transmitters, radios, servos, control, and operation of buddy boxes. When everyone was ready, planes were thrown off into the light lift, with students rotating through to have time on the various aircraft. John flew an Ro-8, lan flew a radian with a rubber band around the prop, Chuck flew a Yellow Jacket, Marty flew and Amigo. While those flights were being made Gary assisted another set of students that arrived from SDSU (Gowdham, Issac, and Diego) with discus launch practice in the backfield. With the light wind conditions, it was clear there were thermals to the north over the parking areas and golf course and a few launched with a CX5 confirmed this. Flying thermals at Torrey is rare and fun! Chuck later also joined in a demo of discus launching with a BAMF2 for the students as did Scott McCurdy who showed later with his BAMF2. Without any PG/HG traffic we were operating RC both on the slope and DLG from the LZ and that was fun and unusual.

October Tow Hook Series Contest Report – John McNeil, CD

We met at Encinitas on Sunday, October 6, for the final Tow Hook of our 2024 season. Conditions started with a low marine layer. It was so low that a full bungee launch would put you into the clouds, making it hard to see! Nonetheless, there was some lift to find, but it was often challenging to work. Really, it was a CD's dream – we love to make pilots work for their time.

We had two pilots flying off the winch, three flying 1.5m, and 12 flying 2m. Given a late start due to visibility and an epically snarled bungee late in the day, we had a busy day. I greatly appreciate the help setting up contests and maintaining equipment. For example, the week before the contest, Brett, Paul, Brian, Milan, and I replaced all the hi-start rubber and then had some fun flying. After this contest, Paul took all the hi-starts home to make the tubing attachment points more reliable and replace the line on the bungee we snarled. The F3X Vault scores are on the following page.

The 2024 Pilots agree we want more events in 2025. Accordingly, the TPG EC has scheduled ten events next year. As attendance grows, and to make time to help each other, we will hold two types of events. Seven events will be bungee-only for 2m and 1.5m. We will replace the winch with another 2m bungee. These days, we will fly in the same format as in 2024, with six rounds for 2m and five for 1.5 in the four-hour open-flying window. The other three events will host a 5 round winch contest alongside a fun-fly for bungee planes where we will place 2m and 1.5m bungees. These fun-fly days are meant to make time for pilots to trim planes together, practice, Q&A, and whatever else we can think of to help each other.

Finally, I would like to share the fun of CD'ing these events next year. It is pretty easy, and I promise you will receive lots of help! **Message me on Discord if you'd like to be a Tow Hook contest director.**

The conditions were perfect for competition because it was possible to catch a thermal at around 20 meters high, but they were not all that easy to hang on to so we saw everyone in the contest drop at least one flight with either a zero or a really low score.

October DLG Contest Report – Justin Tolman, CD

The October DLG contest/clinic event was held on Saturday, October 19th with 14 pilots in attendance. For this round we once again split the field into two flight groups in order to get in eight rounds and maximize flying time. A small front moved through the day before leaving dry, cool air behind. It was a chilly 40 degrees when I opened the gate at 7am.

In warmups, it was clear that lift was going to be sparse and hard to come by in Round 1 (1,2,3,4). In Group A, John McNeil made great work of the tough conditions, amassing 9:04 of flight time, nearly a minute more than Will Lalla and the rest of the group. In Group B, deep to the southwest, I managed to find one lone thermal in a sky full of mush. That thermal allowed me to capture my 4:00 flight on the way to accumulating 9:41 and taking the K over Gary Fogel's 8:20.

With tough conditions persisting in Round 2 (Last 2x3), 3-minute flights were no easy accomplishment. Mengchen Li, was the exception in Group A, as the only pilot getting both of his 3-minute flights taking the K over Fogel. Similarly, in Group B, John McNeil took the K as he was the only pilot able to put up 2, 3-minute flights

October DLG Contest Report (continued)

Round 3 (Best 5x2) came along and thermals were still weak and lackluster. At least this task didn't demand we stay in the air for very long. In Group A, Fogel put in the most efficient performance, dropping just 11-seconds, to take the K over yours truly. In Group B, Milan Bregman matched Fogel's efficiency from the previous round, also dropping only 11-seconds. Will Lalla and Mengchen Li put in great flights and were just tenths of a second short of Milan's time.

Everyone expected conditions to start changing by Round 4 (Big Ladder) but weak lift persisted. Will Lalla, coming off a great showing at the Cal Challenge in Visalia, made great work of the challenging air in Group A to take the K over McNeil. In Group B, Mengchen bested the group by nearly one minute to take the K over Tom Farley.

In Round 5 (3x3:20) we started seeing glimpses of more consistent lift. In Group A, Bregman took advantage of the improving conditions as he accumulated 8:35 of flight time to take the K over Cliff Hunter's 8:14. In Group B, Fogel accumulated 9:48 of flight time to steal the K over my 9:46.

By Round 6 (Last 1x5) those elusive thermals finally started showing up. In Group A, Lalla, myself and Mengchen managed to get our 5-minute flights to share the K. In group B, Scott Mccurdy, Bregman and Fogel also found 5-minute air to share the K.

After Round 6, we took a short break. At this point, a few pilots (Bob Hirsch, Gary Fogel, Chuck Norris, Ian Cummings and John McNeil) headed to the Torrey Pines Gliderport in order to mentor and introduce several UCSD students to slope soaring.

The rest of us stuck around for some afternoon chaos and carnage. By Round 7 (AULD), typical "run down wind Poway" was in full effect. In Group A, Bregman chased thermals downwind while Farley stayed out front and up wind. Both pilots made their second and third 3-minute flights but it was Bregman's 2:22 first flight that earned him the K over Farley. In Group B, I was able to make my first and second flights by running with thermals down wind. Sticking with the same strategy for my third flight, I raced down wind but found no sustaining lift. Aborting that effort just in time allowed me to barely clear the trees by the entry gate and somehow make it back to the field to take the K. Menchen was a victim of the challenging air and suffered a landout in his first flight.

Booming, downwind thermals persisted in Round 8 (Last 2x4). In Group A, Tom Farley decided that running downwind wasn't for him though as he made fantastic work of some upwind wave lift to take K over Mengchen. In Group B, I attempted to find Tom's wave lift but it had vanished by then. Instead, Bregman and I both got our first 4-minute flights chasing thermals down wind. We both chased lift downwind again for our second flights where Bregman landed out and I managed a 2:57 to take the K.

After eight rounds of very diverse flying conditions, I managed to accumulate the most points. Milan Bregman was 2nd and Mengchen LI was 3rd.

The format is team-only; there are no individual scores. Each team requires four pilots. You have plenty of time, so start getting your teams together – and start practicing!

Team DLG format:

- Teams consist of exactly four pilots.
- In each heat, three of the pilots fly while one pilot times and provides team direction.
- Each round, the timer is rotated. After four rounds, all team members will have timed once.
- Contest rounds follow F3K formats except:
 - Flight timing
 - Flight time starts when the last of three pilots releases the model.
 - Flight time ends when the first of three pilots time would end.
 - If any pilot lands out of bounds, then the flight scores zero.
 - (In other words, all three pilots fly each flight together for a single flight time)
 - o For Poker:
 - The timing team member makes the time nomination.
 - All three pilots must make the nominated time (see flight timing above).
 - Timer can force the whole team to re-flight to maximize the score

Who

AMA pilots who are interested in flying with friends, improving their thermal flying skills, and competing for fun.

Why

The goals of this program are:

- Provide a fun, relaxed monthly contest where low-cost aircraft can be competitive
- Various classes encourage greater participation
- Overcome the current field limitations for F3L of 12 pilots max, at Encinitas and 8 at Poway
- Maintain a home for AMA TD competition
- Develop a competitive thermal format for sailplanes under 250g

What

Format:

This format is similar to the successful BARCS FxRES format with modifications to suit our TPG community and fields.

This is a simple format with a 4-hour window, where competitors will fly a number of flights in the window to be determined by the CD based on that day's registration (see the classes section for maximum flight times). There is a landing bonus using F3L landing tapes for all classes. Launches made after the open window will receive zero landing points if within 30 seconds. All launches must occur during the open window. After the 4-hour open flying window, the CD shall tally the scores and may choose to have fly-off rounds. Points in fly-off will be added to points from open flying.

Launches:

Pilots launching RES from bungees are allowed to re-fly if they have a pop-off up to two times in the open window. Winch launch (TD) pilots may have one re-fly if they pop-off.

Landings:

Landings count if there are no shed parts. Upside-down is ok. Landings where the nose is buried and the tail is in the air are also given a zero score.

How We Compete (continued)

2024 TPG Tow Hook Series - F3L/F3RES/TD/1.5m (continued)

Aircraft Classes

Pilots may fly in any one or two of the three classes below. We will fly up to 3 classes depending on attendance:

- 1.5m RES bungee launch. Max flying weight is 250g. Construction materials and techniques must follow F3L rules.
 Maximum flight time is 5 minutes.
- 2m RES bungee launch. Construction materials and techniques must follow F3L rules Maximum flight time is 6 minutes.
- AMA thermal duration open class. Winch launch. Skegs are allowed Maximum flight time is 10 minutes.

Equipment

At least three landing tapes will be provided, marked for F3L. AMA TD will use the same landing bonus formula as the other classes.

F3L compliant bungees will be provided by the club and set up at the CD's direction. At the CDs discretion, all bungees may be shortened from F3L standard to accommodate field conditions.

Winches:

A single winch will be provided by the club when at least 2 pilots register at least one week in advance. The winch shall be set up in parallel with, and at the same length as the stretched bungees. The winch will not have a retriever. The winch shall be run until the chute is at the turn-around after every launch.

When

Refer to posted schedules on RCGroups and the Torrey Pines Gulls website.

Where

TPG Encinitas Flight Center, except within 5 days following rain, when the contest will relocate to the Poway Flight Center.

How

John McNeil, in the role of TPG Thermal coordinator, will recruit a CD for each contest. This format does not require the sound system or timing board, but does require bungees and sometimes a winch.

How We Compete (continued)

F5J Fun Fly and Contest/Clinic Series



TPG will continue our F5J style foamy fun fly contests (and clinic) in 2024 at our Poway field. This is truly a fun-fly and a great way to get into F5J style flying. Any foamy or stick-built plane up to 2m (or so) is welcome. Night Radians are very popular but we also see Yellow Jackets (stick-built) and a variety of other vintage foamy and balsa stick-built aircraft.

We fly 7-minute windows with standard F5J landing tapes. If you are just getting started and do not have an Altis yet, no problem. Your timer will give you the 30 second call to cut your motor and the CD will announce a default launch height to be used for scoring purposes.

We typically pause mid-contest for a quick clinic. Subjects generally focus on F5J topics of interest to pilots getting into the format. The events are free but we still ask all pilots to sign up on F3X Vault so we know how many to expect and can run the matrix ahead of time.

We'll have another series of events coming up in 2025.

What is LSF? – Gary Fogel

The League of Silent Flight (LSF) https://www.silentflight.org/ is the special interest group (SIG) representing RC soaring to the Academy of Model Aeronautics. LSF has its own lengthy and important history, having first been conceived of in Northern California over 50 years ago, and helps arrange the annual RC soaring Nationals at Muncie, Indiana each summer. In addition to this, LSF has two types of Soaring Accomplishment Programs (SAPs) that encourage personal skill development in the sport and are fun! There is an SAP that is strictly for RC soaring (the oldest and original SAP) and with the advent of electric launch methods, an eSAP was added more recently that duplicates the original SAP but with the use of electric motors for launch.

Each SAP consists of a series of five levels of achievement with increasing difficulty (Figure 1). The levels involve slope and thermal soaring, spot landings, crosscountry flights and participation at contests. A pilot needs to achieve Level I before proceeding to Level II and so forth all the way up through Level V.

What is LSF? - (continued)



Similarly, pilots who regularly hone their skills at contests generally improve in overall performance and over time, seek increasingly different and difficult tasks. By the time a pilot achieves Level IV, the Level V tasks can feel daunting. A 2-hour thermal duration flight. An 8-hour slope duration flight (some refer to this as the "bladder test"). A goal and return cross-country flight of 6.2 miles out and 6.2 miles back. Its longer than it seems. And Level V requires 3 contest wins at large contests over 20 participants. These days it can be hard to find contests of this size, and the requirement to win them really means the pilot has to be on the top of their game. It can take years or decades for a pilot to complete Level V. Some pilots never do complete Level V; in fact, only 138 people in the history of the program have done so.

So how do you get started? It's **EASY**. Firstly, go to: https://www.silentflight.org/index.php/lsf-program/lsf-tasks and print out a copy of the voucher form. Choose the path you wish (SAP and/or eSAP)

Bring the appropriate voucher with you to any of our many TPG events in 2024 and participate! If, for instance, you are flying in an F5J contest, each landing can be considered as a spot landing for the Level I and II requirements. Even the contest flights can have sufficient time to satisfy Level I requirements. Whenever you do make an achievement, have the contest director or your timer sign your form as a witness. We have Torrey Pines Gliderport (and other slopes) at our disposal – easy to get a 15 min slope flight with your buddies.

Once you've completed all of the Level I tasks, submit the completed voucher to LSF Secretary Walter "Wally" Adazczik at Isf secretary@silentflight.org as a pdf scan or photo that clearly shows the witness signatures. Wally will then review your voucher and email you your acceptance or rejection of the voucher submission. If for some reason your voucher is rejected, you will have to adjudicate rejections with Wally.

A question then – who in the TPG has what LSF levels in SAP and eSAP? Well, we collect that information as a part of membership renewal. The Table on the following page provides the current LSF Levels for those who indicated so on their membership forms. This can (and should!) of course change over time.

Note that we have many members who are SAP Level I and 3 members who are eSAP Level 1. It doesn't take much for them to get to Level II. At the other end of the spectrum, we have 8 members who are Level IV. It's going to take some teamwork to get them to Level V. In between we have lots of pilots who can benefit by flying in our contests or getting out for some slope duration at Torrey, etc. If you aren't on the list and have achieved an LSF level, please let me know.

What is LSF? - (continued)



How many Level increases can TPG members achieve in 2024 for either SAP or eSAP? Feel free to reach out to me or others on this list and they will be pleased to help recommend some strategies or serve as a witness if they can, for your achievements. On June 8, we're planning an LSF day at Poway and Torrey to help get people signed off. We might throw in some additional LSF days if there is interest.

Use our many contests and fun flys as a way to help advance in these programs. Just be sure to bring your vouchers and if necessary, arrange in advance for the proper number and type of witnesses so they can sign your form afterwards.

In order to maintain a line of communication among members, we have a TPG Google Group. Please make sure that our club Membership Chairman has your current email address. You can confirm this by contacting membership@torreypinesgulls.org. If you are not already a member of the TPG Google Group, you will be sent an invitation to join.

When you join as a member of the private TPG Google Group, the club will distribute notifications, newsletters, contest events and holiday party info, etc. This information will keep you informed of all club activities throughout the year. You don't need a Gmail address to participate in Google Groups, but you do need to be a member of TPG.

Google Groups provides a great way of communicating with one another. If you have any questions or concerns about almost anything having to do with flying, building, finding another club member, etc., you can post them on Google Groups. It also allows you to send links and attachments, just like regular email.

...and, very importantly, since all postings/emails are done through Google Groups, your actual email address in not visible when notifications are sent out to the club members. Also, only members of the group can post to the group, so joining the group does not add to your spam burden.

So, verify that the club has your correct email, make sure you receive an invitation to join Google Groups and sign up!

New Procedure for Joining Google Groups

Here are the steps new club members need to take to be added to Google Groups if they don't have a Gmail account/address:

- 1. Go to the **Google Account Sign In page**.
- 2. Click Create account.
- 3. Enter your name.
- 4. Click Use my current email address instead.
- 5. Enter your current email address.
- 6. Click Next.
- 7. Verify your email address with the code sent to your existing email.
- 8. Click Verify.
- 9. Confirm with TPG Membership (Cliff Hunter) the above steps have been completed, use the following email address.




Unlike the old Yahoo Forum, RCGroups allows you to post photos and videos. By subscribing, you can keep up with the latest events, club activities and member postings.


